RULES & REGULATIONS

- All persons wishing to compete for prizes in the Pavilion Sections must have their entries and entry forms to the
 pavilion as per each section in the schedule. No late entries will be accepted. Judging of exhibits in the Art and
 Produce pavilions will be on Friday 2nd March 2024 with the exception of classes nominated as "People's Choice".
- All exhibitors must submit their entry with a signed entry form for each section they enter.
- Children 16 and under must enter using the separate schedule for Junior entries with an indemnity clause signed by a parent or guardian.
- All exhibits must be the bona fide property of, grown by, or the work of the exhibitor.
- The Committee will not be responsible for any damage or breakage or loss of any exhibit, and all persons competing
 in all Sections do so at their own risk.
- The decision of the Stewards in case of any dispute will be final. No prize will be awarded in any class unless, in the Judge's opinion, the exhibit merits it. No tied prizes will be awarded.
- Championship Prizes are awarded based on a point score that will be calculated as follows: Category winner = 4 points; 1st =3 points, 2nd =2 points. In the event of a tied point score, an extra point for each exhibit entered by each championship contender will be factored into the tally.
- Exhibits can be claimed or sold by the exhibitor from 2:00 pm on Sunday 3rd March 2024 after the entry form has been collected from the Steward and signed off.
- To claim prizes, exhibitors must collect their prize cards from the Steward to take to the Showground Office for collection on Sunday 3rd March 2024 from 2:00pm.
- All monies or vouchers not claimed by 1st April 2024 will be used to help finance next year's event.
- Protest made against any exhibits awarded a prize must be in writing and lodged with the Secretary within 24 hours of the award being made public, accompanied with a deposit of \$5 which shall be forfeited to the Association if the matter of the protest is considered frivolous by the Committee. If the protest is upheld by the Committee, the protester shall be summoned to meet the Committee at a time and place mentioned in the summons and if he or she fails to attend or make reasonable excuse for his or her absence, he or she shall forfeit his or her right to the prize. No appeal shall be entered into where there are no grounds of appeal other than the decision of the judges.
- The Committee reserve the right to add or delete any event or rearrange the program as required.
- To better achieve a high-quality art exhibition, the time frame for entering exhibits in the Art and Photography sections is Thursday 29th February 2024 from 1pm - 4pm or by prior arrangement with the Steward.
- Exhibitors who have a large quantity of entries in Plants, Fruit and Vegetables, may enter items that will keep fresh on Thursday 29th February 2024 from 1pm – 4pm or by prior arrangement with the Steward.
- Exhibitors entering the Cake decoration category 3, need to be entered on Thursday 29 February 2024 and be to the stewards by 12 noon Friday 1st March 2024
- All Exhibitors must be left the pavilion by 12.15 pm Friday 1st March 2024 so Judging can start.


